


### WILLIAM KONKIN'S NEW SCHOOL HOODIES

## **HONOURING DIVERSITY**

#### **❖** INCLUSIVE CURRICULUM

- We continue to add resources to schools specific to inclusive education. Over the last few months, district staff have engaged with SD91's Student Voice group to gather some student perspectives and purchase resources that were explicitly asked for by students including resources on sexual health.
- Each of our schools has a SOGI lead who is supported by Claire Mckay. This group meets monthly to both share what is happening in schools and do some professional learning.

#### **ENGAGE OUR WORKFORCE**

#### **STAFF DEVELOPMENT**

- Over the 21 22 school year, we have had school teams from across our district work with:
  - O **Jo Chrona:** Teachers learned how to address the 9<sup>th</sup> professional standard by learning more about adding the 'HOW' and 'WHY' of adding Indigenous content and knowledge to high school courses.
  - Faye Brownlie: SD91 educators have participated in an inquiry learning model with Faye to learn, implement, and reflect on a variety of literacy strategies to engage learners.
  - Peter Liljedahl: Teachers have worked with Peter on the key concepts contained in his work on 'Building Thinking Classrooms.'
- We are pleased to confirm that all 3 of these world-class experts will continue their relationship with SD91 educators for the 22 23 school year.
- Director of Instruction, Mark Gauthier, will expand on this update at the March 14<sup>th</sup> Board of Education meeting.
