

'THINKING CLASSROOMS' WITH DR. PETER LILIEDAHL

We are so excited to continue our work with Dr. Peter Liljedahl for the 2022-23 school year. This year we have teams joining us from 9 schools (3 high school and 6 elementary teams). As we embark on our second year of learning with Dr. Liljedahl, we have some new team members beginning their journey in Thinking Classrooms strategies, as well as many returning educators. Our focus throughout the year will be on integrating the strategies, building numeracy tasks with our local content,



and moving toward authentic assessment of thinking tasks. New team members will leave with the materials to start using Thinking Classrooms in their own classes, as well as the book resource "Building Thinking Classrooms". Returning educators will receive a copy of the book "5 Practices for Orchestrating Productive Mathematics Discussions". FAYE BROWNLIE INCLUSIVE LITEACY STARTEGIES LEARING SERIES

Beginning on Monday Sept. 26th, school teams will be working with internationally renowned BC educational literacy expert Faye Brownlie. In a mostly virtual learning series, Faye will support educators as they delve into strengthening nonfiction learning skills across 3 learning sessions and two sessions focused on co-teaching. Then after the winter break, she will lead the learning about fostering voracious reading through literature circles.

To encourage exploration of this approach to reading, each participating school will be gifted the 10 copies of two books by Indigenous authors to add to their literature circle collections ("The Barren Grounds" by David A Roberston; "Aggie & Mudgy" by Wendy Proverb). Each participant will also be gifted a copy of the new edition of the professional resource, "Grand Conversations" by Faye Brownlie.

JOYFUL JOURNEY

During the Pandemic we were not able to engage our future and new learners in the way we had in the past through community and school Ready Set Learn events. Last school year we decided to find a way to offer these events in some way, in an online format. Thus, began *Joyful Journey* with a focus on reading as well as a partnership with Dr. Janet Mort who supported the creation of videos on literacy development through play-



based learning. In looking at the data from our kindergarten learners we realized gross motor skills was an area of concern similar to literacy. Therefore, we

created the Summer Joyful journey Contest 2022 and asked families to support more than just literacy with their children. They shared a picture with us about the variety of play-based activities they were engaged in with their children over the summer in order to foster an interaction between home and school even prior to starting school. The contest was open to families with children aged 0 to 8, with submissions from across communities, as well as from EBUS. Each child who participated received a book, a toy to promote gross motor skills, and a crafty game to promote fine motor skills.

STUDENT & FAMILY AFFORDABILITY FUND

As announced on August 29, 2022, the Province is helping to make back-to-school more affordable for students and their families who are struggling with rising costs of living due to global inflation. Through the Student and Family Affordability



Fund, our District has received funding (\$515 000) to ensure students are fed and have the school supplies they need to be successful this year. This one-time funding will help our schools to expand food/school meal programs, make sure students have the school supplies they need, and cover any additional fees so that students in need can take part in activities, such as field trips and sports. Planning around this fund has been a collaboration among school/District staff, the Aboriginal Education Council, District/School Parent Advisory Councils, as well as other partner groups.

W.L. McLeod Elementary is committed to making the transition to school as easy as possible for its newest students each year. The McLeod Cares program is celebrating 15 years of students helping students! This program pairs grade 6 student leaders with incoming kindergarten students and their families. The leaders, trained by principal **Libby Hart** just prior to the start of the school year, contact the families of in-coming kindergarten students to introduce themselves and answer questions. Student leaders in the McLeod Cares program welcome the new kids on their first day, but the welcoming doesn't stop there. During the first week of school, they are out on the playground, helping and answering questions and looking after the young learners. TEAM FEATURE: THE INCLUSIVE EDUCATION TEAM!

SD 91's Inclusive Education department continues to employ a full complement of professionals, to support the students we serve. We have increased our FTE for Speech and Language by 0.4 FTE (2 additional days of service) to meet the increased needs of our learners. This summer Uli Roessler, Behaviour interventionist, held a workshop for school teams which included Learning Support Workers Personal Attendants Teachers and Principals. The workshop engaged school teams in learning how to support children experiencing behaviour needs in the classroom. A summer session regarding the development of competency-based goals for learners with behaviour needs was also held. Fifteen Case Managers attended the session.

FRAMEWORK FOR ENHANCING STUDENT LEARNING (FESL)

British Columbia's Ministry of Education initiated a reporting process in the 2021-22 school year titled 'Framework for Enhancing Student Learning' (FESL). FESL "brings a formalized approach to the planning and reporting expectations for

schools with a focus on enhancing student learning and success. It combines accountability with evidence-informed decision making and system-wide continuous improvement to support equity of outcomes for all students in the provincial K-12 public system. The Framework also reflects a public commitment by Indigenous peoples, Indigenous rightsholders, education partners and communities to work together to improve student learning and enhance the intellectual, social and career development of all learners."
