
HADIH/HADI/HADEEH AND WELCOME TO DUKAI OOZA (JUNE)


STRATEGIC PLAN UPDATES: GOAL 1: HONOUR DIVERSITY

KOH LEARNING WITH UNBC ON THE STELLAQUO RIVER: ELEVATING STUDENT VOICE

During the day students were able to learn more about traditional knowledge as well as biodiversity values, and also explore

Students learned about being action-oriented around sustainability practices to stop climate change while at the same time focussing on economic prosperity. It was moving to hear numerous youths speaking their traditional language and expressing their gratitude for the chance to be heard by adults, as partners.





READY, SET, LEARN WITH STRONGSTART!

StrongStart and Kindergarten educators from across the school district participated in community-based Ready, Set, Learn events this spring. The events took place in all four of the main communities nestled within the school district boundaries

and helped to foster positive connections between families, the schools, and local community agencies. StrongStart and Kindergarten educators organized and led a variety of play-based stations while parents learned about early learning programs and services, their local elementary schools, and their communities. DUAL CREDITS WITH THE COLLEGE OF NEW CALEDONIA


SD91 has been selected to participate in the Early Childhood Dual Credit Project with the Ministry of Education and Child Care. Through this dual credit project, the school district will work with the College of New Caledonia (CNC) to offer a dual credit Early Childhood Educator (ECE) course to secondary students in January 2024. This on-line course, (ECCL 156 – Care and Guidance), examines principles and techniques which

support children's optimal development. Emphasis is placed on responding to the needs of the individual, promoting positive self-concept, fostering pro-social behaviour, and addressing the factors that may impact behaviours. Upon successful completion of this course, students will have completed the province's ECE Assistant (ECEA) academic requirement and could apply to the ECE Registry to become an ECEA. As ECEAs, students will be able to gain employment at a licensed childcare facility. SD91 will work closely with SD28 (Quesnel) and SD57 (Prince George) in a formal partnership to offer the required number of course enrolments through this dual credit project. Currently, we are in the process of updating the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) between SD91 and CNC with a targeted completion date of June 30th, 2023. SD91 looks forward to working with partners and the Ministry of Education and Child Care to increase dual credit course offerings to secondary students.

THE SD91 SPEAKER SERIES CONTINUES

School District 91 partnered with representatives from the Ministry of Education and Child Care to provide our last Speaker Series session of the year. Caregivers, PAC members, school staff and community joined online to learn more about Communicating Student Learning.
